






7. Quinte Arts Council

The Quinte Arts Council has been cultivating creativity in the region since 1967. The gallery, gift shop and offices are housed in a building erected in 1870. Many of the interior walls are the original limestone.

Quinte Arts Council will be exhibiting a Heritage-themed art show during September and October at our gallery and gift shop that can be enjoyed by those participating in this Doors Open event. Artists from the region will have art work that reflects the heritage of this vibrant community as well as work that has been created using techniques and craftsmanship that have been around for generations.

The artists participating include Nancy Bennett, Terri Horricks, Perry Poupore, Brian Massey, Peggy Holcroft-Cameron, Lola Reid-Allin, Donna Bonin, Florence Lennox, Marie Timbers and Ray & Lena Dearborn.



8. Belleville Club

Established in 1914, this social club is a not-for-profit limited company owned by its members and shareholders. The building, which dates from around 1900, maintains its post-Victorian elegance. The ambience is enhanced by high ceilings, expansive staircases, brilliant Persian carpets, hardwood floors and rich, oak-panelled walls in the main dining room.



5. Belleville Public Library and

Designed by Zeidler Partnership
Architects, this new community facility
opened in 2006 and includes an art
gallery that features the work of Manly
McDonald and many other local artists.



9. Hotel Quinte

Built in 1895 by an association of local
entrepreneurs headed by Senator
Henry Corby, the Hotel Quinte with its
Italian-tiled lobby and marble pillars
which are still in place today was
considered opulent. Special note should
be taken of the original ornate ceiling
in the lobby and restaurants.

6. Hastings County Historical Society

This location was occupied by Stroud's Jewellery store
for many years. It is currently the downtown office of
the Hastings County Historical Society. The site will
feature displays of historical photographs and maps as
well as plans for the new Community Archives.



10. Hastings and Prince Edward
Regiment Military Museum

Constructed 100 years ago, this building was based on the standard
American armoury model, designed for a single army unit.
The museum offers exhibits on local military history since 1863.



11. Belleville City Hall

Originally built in 1872 as Belleville's market building and town hall, this attractive structure with its 44-metre clock tower has dominated the downtown landscape for more than a century. Imaginative interior renovations (1987-88) by architect Bill White preserved many of the original architectural features, while adding 10,000 square feet of working space. This site has a blue and gold provincial plaque.



3. St. Andrew's
Presbyterian Church

St. Andrew's has served the community since 1831. The current building, erected in 1872, was enlarged after a fire in 1895. Its architecture shows the talent of the craftsmen of the day. The church contains impressive stained-glass windows and memorials to both individuals and groups. The sanctuary acoustics are reputed to be the best in Belleville.



12. Memorial Arena

Dedicated to honour those lost in the First and Second World Wars, the Belleville Memorial Arena was the home of the Allan Cup (1958) and World Champion Belleville McFarlands Hockey Club (1959). Commemorative picture plaques honouring the McFarlands flank the main entrance. This site has a blue and gold provincial plaque.

4. Greenley's Bookstore -
Corby Building

The 1820s stone building was once the home and bakery of Henry Corby. The foundation and large open hearth are original. A third storey was added about 1883 and the present brick façade in 1891. The original wood and tin ceiling is still visible on the store level.

The Chamber of Commerce resides in a 132-year-old log cabin moved to Belleville for the 1978 centennial. Originally located at Haley's Station in the Ottawa Valley, the cabin was reassembled log by log at Panter Park on the Moira River. In 1980, the cabin was moved again to its current location.

2. St. Michael the Archangel Church

This impressive neo-Gothic limestone structure with its massive belltower (the highest point in the city) was built in 1887. Destroyed by fire in 1904, it was immediately reconstructed and re-opened the same year. Officially established in 1827, St. Michael's is the first Roman Catholic parish in Hastings County.



13. Montrose Inn

Built in 1916 for R.J. Graham, a prominent businessman and former mayor of Belleville, this magnificent antebellum-style mansion features two 70-foot verandas. The Graham family owned the house until 1981. Restored to its former grandeur, it is now a luxury bed and breakfast and tea room. The house was featured in the television series Road to Avonlea.

14. The Belleville Cemetery



The Belleville Cemetery, which dates from 1872, is the burial place of several well-known individuals, including: Susanna Moodie (pioneer author), her husband Dunbar (first sheriff of Hastings County), Sir Gilbert Parker (writer and politician) and Sir Mackenzie Bowell (fifth prime minister of Canada and publisher of The Intelligencer).






15. Belleville Scout-Guide Museum

The Belleville Scout-Guide Museum, founded in 1976, is the largest museum of its kind in Canada. The museum contains over 20,000 items relevant to the lives of Lord and Lady Baden-Powell and scouting and guiding in Canada and the local area.

16. Gerry O'Conner Water Treatment Plant

The plant, located on the Bay of Quinte, has been providing water to the city of Belleville since 1887. In 1994, a \$40-million, six-and-a-half-year expansion began, upgrading the plant from 1950s technology to current industry standards. This project culminated in 2001 with the rededication of this facility as the Gerry O'Connor Water Treatment Plant.


This building was built in 1938 as a Pentecostal church and later used as a furniture store before being renovated for its current use. The slope of the original windows was retained, while the front and interior have been tastefully remodeled. The original shape of the altar area has changed little, and some of the original architectural features remain visible.

18. Glanmore National

Glanmore is an excellent example of Second Empire architecture in Canada. The home was built in 1883 for banker J.P.C. Phillips. Interiors feature ornate frescoed ceilings, a suspended staircase and intricate woodwork. See original furnishings as well as decorative objects and artwork from the Couldery Collection. Restored decorative finishes will be highlighted.
